In her opening address to the Council, Mrs Brown noted that she wanted Scarning to be a tidier village that was free of litter and dog mess. She wanted villagers to take pride in the village. She said she was also keen to find a means through which the Water Meadows could be managed, and expressed her wish that there should be an Annual fete, supported by the Parish Council and village bodies.

A Messy Problem

According to the Keep Britain Tidy Campaign, 95% of the British public are worried about the amount of dog fouling in public places. Not only is dog fouling unpleasant, it's dangerous, and in some instances - can lead to blindness. Children are particularly at risk. People who do not clean up after their dog can be given a £50 on the

spot fine. If they refuse to pay the fine they can be prosecuted and may face a court appearance with a maximum penalty of £1,000. If your dog fouls in a public place, you must clean up the mess under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996. Advice to dog owners. Always carry a poop scoop, and a bag to carry the mess to a dog bin. If there is not a dog bin nearby, please take the mess home. There are numerous dog bins throughout Scarning. Please use them.
