Parish Council

At the Annual Parish Meeting, Parish Council Chairman, Alan Glister, noted that the highlight of the past year for him was to be invited to the official opening of the extended and refurbished Seaming Primary School. The opening, he said, was 'a very memorable occasion for the village' and he extended his congratulations to all those involved. The school, he said, 'is now a real asset to the village and surrounding district, and will serve them for many years to come.'

In his report, Mr Glister noted that the Parish Council had successfully lobbied Norfolk County Council for a speed restriction of 50mph between the two 40mph areas on Dereham Road. The Parish Council, he said, will continue to lobby for a 20mph outside the school.

Mr Glister said that after much deliberation the Parish Council had decided to grant aid many village groups, notably the Village Hall Trust & Estate, Seaming Church and the Playing Field Committee. He said that this financial support from the Council precept is essential to the long term future of these village assets if we are to remain a viable parish moving forward together in harmony.'

Mr Glister noted that he was disheartened by the lack of progress on the Water Meadows. The area, he said, was suffering from the lack of maintenance and he expressed his hope that something positive will soon be done regarding the site. He said that he would like to see a Committee established to run the site.

In conclusion, Mr Glister gave a vote of thanks to all the village organisations 'for what they give to make our village such a special place to live'.

All Work and No Play ...

Seaming is fortunate to have two large playing fields. The longest standing is behind the Village Hall and was given to the village in 1947 by Arthur Faulkner Wright, a long time resident of Scaming. Facilities on the field include two all weather tennis courts, available to hire throughout the year at just £2 an hour, a Bowls Club and a children's play area, with slide, swings and adventure play equipment. There is also ample room to kick a ball, fly a kite and so on.

The newer playing field is on the Water Meadows and features two football goals, an adventure play area and smaller children's play equipment, all of

which was installed by the Parish Council. An area for smaller children who want to kick a ball is just off Ted Ellis Walk, where two goal posts have been installed.

The Parish Council would like to establish a committee to manage the playing field on the Water Meadows, similar to that which runs the playing field behind the Village Hall. If you are interested in becoming a member of the committee, please contact the parish clerk on 687492.
